Cultural Diversity

Culture is the set of customs and traits acquired by Man over time, in contact with the environment in which one lives, and which are transmitted from generation to generation. Each person can identify with one or more cultures.



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Cultural conflict

It's not always easy to get along with people who are different from us. When people from different cultures come together, there are bound to be some misunderstandings.

The most common example of cultural conflict is when people from different cultures have different ideas about what is acceptable behavior.

Cultural conflict can often lead to **misunderstandings** which can lead to **anger**, **frustration**, **violence**, **hostility**, **xenophobia**, and even **war**.










Accepting others

Accepting differences helps you become a better citizen, making new relationships, and broadening your mind.

Social justice

Social justice is about promoting equality and fairness. Social justice is the general acceptance of responsibility for the dignity and worth of an individual, group or community, regardless of race, gender, sexual orientation, religion or any other attribute.








The Rule of Law

Our role: Being a good citizen


Citizenship is the highest form of individual responsibility. It implies a community of interest, shared beliefs and values, social responsibility, and mutual respect. Being good a citizen can help democracy.

Being a good citizen is more than just voting and paying taxes. It means accepting others, be it in your family, in society, or even on the other side of the world.
